Judaism

- The religion originated in Israel around 4000 years ago.
- Jews believe there is only one God. Judaism was the first religion to only believe in one God and that the world was a gift from God.
- Jewish people was open to persecution and prejudice in the 1920's due to Hitler disliking the Jews due to their power and wealth. Many Jewish people lost their lives due to this.
- Jewish people fled to Britain and countries surrounding Germany to seek refuge. The Kindertransport saved children refugees.

## Key Vocabulary

<b>Religion</b>	The belief in and worship of a God or Gods, or any such system of belief and worship.
<b>Harmony</b>	When people are peaceful and agree with each other.
<b>Respect</b>	Politeness, honour and care shown towards someone or something.
<b>Persecution</b>	Unfair or cruel treatment over a long period of time due to race, religion or political beliefs.
<b>Discrimination</b>	Treating a group of people differently, usually in a worse way due to their race, religion etc
<b>Prejudice</b>	An unfair and unreasonable opinion or feeling formed without enough thought or knowledge.
<b>Beth Shalom</b>	A word to represent house of peace which is the holocaust centre.
<b>Remembrance</b>	Remembering and showing respect for someone who has died or a past event.
<b>Bystander</b>	A person who is standing near and watching something happening but not taking part.
<b>Upstander</b>	A person who speaks or acts in support of an individual who is in an uncomfortable situation e.g. being bullied.
<b>Kindertransport</b>	An organised rescue for Jewish children.
